It was the photo of one of the nine trying to enter the school a young girl being taunted, harassed and threatened by an angry mob that grabbed the world's attention and kept its disapproving gaze on Little Rock, Arkansas.


Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry by Mildred D. Taylor – Set in Mississippi at the height of the Depression, this is the story of one family's struggle to maintain their integrity, pride, and independence in the face of racism and social injustice. And it is also the story of Cassie Logan, an independent girl who discovers over the course of an important year why having land of their own is so crucial to the Logan family, even as she learns to draw strength from her own sense of dignity and self-respect.

Little Rock Girl **1957** by Shelley Tougas *Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry* by Mildred D. Taylor

For the nonfiction novel, *Little Rock Girl 1957*, consider the following questions and answer in paragraph form: How do the photographs, quotes, text, and images work together to show the reader how the conflict over equal rights led to crisis? How do photos and images develop and enhance your understanding of the text? Include at least one specific example and provide the page number.

For the fiction novel, *Roll of Thunder Hear My Cry*, write a paragraph that addresses the following prompt: Throughout the novel the reader sees evidence of racism and prejudice damaging society. Provide examples of characters and events from the novel that support this theme.
